West Whiting Avenue

Status: city-recognized Historic District

This block's development of single-family residences dates primarily to the mid-1920s, so revival styles are more prevalent than bungalows. The block does have a rare example of a Spanish style bungalow court – one of the few constructed in Fullerton – at the northwest corner of Whiting and Richman Avenues. A Local Landmark, the bungalow court conveys a quiet charm rather than architectural daring, much like the other properties on the block.

Several houses constructed in recent years have been designed in the style and manner consonant with earlier architecture, and mature landscaping and old street lamps help retain the early ambience of the neighborhood. At the request of property owners in 1997, a residential preservation zone (R-1-7.2P) was applied to the block as a way to protect and preserve the traditional streetscape design.



This district contains two Local Landmarks: the Sans Souci Court at 501 W. Whiting Avenue and the Julius Bradford House at 545 W. Whiting Avenue. The Osborne House at 546 W. Whiting is a Significant Property.
